When I looked at my year planner on the wall in front of me in my study I could hardly believe that it was February when I had last been on holiday - five months had come and gone since then so contrary to what some may think I was definitely in need of some 'Rest and Relaxation'!

Thankfully I have to say that is exactly what I found on our special holiday this year.

Normally it takes me a day or two to fully relax and clear my mind of everything back home and kind of park cares and concerns for a few weeks but that was not the case this year.

An early rise and flight to Naples, a wonderful car transfer through Naples to the port followed by a hydrofoil journey passing Vesuvius and Capri across to the island of Ischia.

News from Overseas

I have included articles before in relation to the Cochrane family who emigrated to Australia many years ago but still keep in touch with us. Only a couple of years ago Robert and his wife, Merlin were here on holiday and attended morning worship with us. Robert sent me the following information in June.

Some info on my Aunt Janet.

Janet Cochrane was born in Holytown in 1931. She studied nursing at the Glasgow Royal Infirmary and finished her midwifery at the Edinburgh Royal Infirmary.

She then joined the Queen Alexandra Royal Army Nursing Corps and commissioned as an Officer. Her service with the British Army took her to Egypt [during the heightened tensions over the Suez Canal], Gibraltar, Malaya [during the Malayan Emergency] and she also served aboard the Troop Ship Dunera which was transporting British soldiers and their families to Cyprus, East Africa and to the Caribbean. She also served in the UK, reaching the rank of Major before she Married Peter [Royal Navy] and the rules said she had to resign.

Janet continued Nursing in the UK until 1970 when Peter was posted to South Australia [Woomera Rocket Range Testing Facility] then finally settled in Canberra.

Janet & Peter were quiet stalwarts in the local community in rural Queanbeyan NSW, managing the country fire association and community hall.

Janet is survived by her husband Peter, brother John, niece Heather and family, nephew Robert and family, great nieces and nephews in Canberra and Adelaide

There will be a funeral service to mark her passing at St Stephens Presbyterian Church in Queanbeyan NSW at 11am on Friday 16 June 2017 before she is privately cremated.

An Important Date to Remember

Every year the Lutheran Church remembers the 31st October as a very special day. Why? This was the date in 1517 when Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses on the door of the Schlosskirche (Castle Church) in Wittenberg in Saxony. Nothing happens purely by chance and this event is no exception.

One evening Martin Luther was walking back home through a wooded area when a thunderstorm broke out. A thunderstorm can be frightening but particularly so when among trees. It was during this storm that Luther shouted out that he would become a monk.

The church in an effort to raise money had introduced the Sale of Indulgences. The main perpetrator of this was Johannes Tetzel. The people were told that if they purchased an indulgence their deceased relative would go immediately to heaven. Luther was most certainly not in favour of this practice and it must have spurred him on to do something about it.

As a monk Martin Luther would spend time both reading and studying the Bible. As a result of his studies he became aware that the teachings of the church and what was written in Scripture diverged on quite a number of occasions. He pleaded his case with the senior members of the church but in spite of all his efforts he was finally ex-communicated.

Returning to the Theses they dealt with points from the Bible and also with the practices and procedures of the church. They aroused a great storm within the church. What must be realised is that the ordinary men and women would have required Latin to read the Bible. This made them pawns as far as the church's hierarchy was concerned.

The next main development was the invention of the printing press by Johannes Gutenberg. This was a major step forward. No longer would everything have to be written by hand. Many copies of documents could also be produced.

One evening as Luther was returning he was captured not by his enemies but by his friends who were afraid for his safety. He was taken to the Wartburg in Erfurt. The Kurfurst or Elector was in charge of the Wartburg and the area around it. Germany as we know it today did not exist. Unification did not take place until three centuries after Luther's death. While in the Wartburg, Luther set to work and translated the New Testament, considerably shorter than the Old Testament, into German. He is credited with having standardised the language. This was a tremendous step forward.

Don't imagine that Luther never left the Wartburg. He disguised himself and went out and about preaching the truths of the Bible. Judging from pictures of him he would have been difficult to recognise.

Other articles were written by him and thanks to the new printing press they could be distributed more widely. Articles written by Luther found their way into the Convent where Katharina von Bora was. Katharina had been deposited in the Convent when she was under twelve years old. It was almost inevitable that she would take her vows and become a nun. Luther's articles influenced her and despite the dangers she and other nuns fled. They managed to reach Wittenberg. After some time Katharina became Frau Luther.

Martin Luther lived in what had been a monastery. His study within that large building is surprisingly small. In what was the refectory he lectured to the students as they ate. That was the measure of his devotion to the Word of God. He always insisted that we should live by faith alone. His lectures became known as "Table Talk".

The thunderstorm which made Luther make his decision to become a monk, the Sale of Indulgences by Tetzel were to result in the 95 Theses being nailed to the Church. Luther's efforts to change the church from within led to his demise from that church. The invention of the printing press, the translation of the New Testament and the distribution of other literature were able to open the minds of the people. God's hand can be seen at work through all these events. Others such as Philip Melanchton would follow on and complete what had been initiated by Martin Luther.

Praise Gathering - Review

I'm writing this article on Monday 12th June while it is still fresh in my mind after four of us from the congregation attended 'Praise Gathering' in Glasgow's Royal Concert Hall last night. I believe others attended on Saturday evening. For me it was my first time attending this event but I can tell you I won't be missing it in future. I would heartily commend it to anyone reading this article and please, tell your friends and relatives about it. They will not be disappointed.

Praise Gathering has its origins in a choir which came together in 1985 to sing the 'Psalms Alive' songs, inviting singers - skilled and unskilled, but with a heart for God - to come and take part in this corporate act of Praise. The history of PG is therefore really a history of God at work in the lives of ordinary people who have experienced His love and forgiveness in their own lives, and for whom praising and worshipping with their voices is an expression of gratitude which can facilitate the joy of His presence. Over the years, many people have responded to that invitation and last year there were around 350 singers drawn from 140 Scottish churches and this year the numbers were similar.

The choir leader explained that the hymns being sung were modern worship songs mostly written in Australia or America although one of the songs had been written a few miles outside Glasgow in Greenock of all places. One of the hymn writers from America was Onaje Jefferson who sang a few solo songs wonderfully and when combined with the backing from the choir, it made the hair on my neck stand up......in a really really good way. He also explained that music was a gift from God and should be appreciated as such and cited numerous passages from scripture that confirmed the importance of music to the Lord in making the joyful noise that would be pleasing and acceptable to Him. Well this choir certainly ticked all these boxes and then some. The sound produced by all these voices was incredible and I couldn't imagine anyone failing to be deeply moved by the combination of the words being sung combined with the massive harmonically delightful delivery.
