A Note from the Minister...

Do you remember the childhood game called 'See who breaks the sugar bowl?'

I certainly do and I recall many a car trip to my Granma's in Morecambe being passed with my brothers and I playing that game. I also recall the determination we each had not to be the one who spoke first!

It is only in later life that you realise it was a game purely devised by adults or our parents to try and get a little peace and quiet on a long trip!

It did work though and I know I have used the same game with my own grandchildren at times on long car trips!

However, it struck me that this kind of game might indeed be a good way of trying to get some silence into our lives for it seems to me that in our world today times of complete silence are getting so difficult to find and yet we do need them for a whole host of reasons - not least for our own well-being.

It is rarely quiet at the manse with all the lorries going by the front door day and night but the other evening on arriving back to the manse from some visits it so happened that it was quite quiet for a change and how wonderful it was to be able to hear in that quiet the blackbird which lives in the front garden singing away and as I stood and listened the beauty of his song was absolutely amazing - it touched my soul!

Likewise I came out of the door of our flat in Largs last week early in the morning and in the quiet of the day I was totally mesmerised by the bleating of the lambs in the farmer's field next to us - it was a joyous sound to hear them and it lifted my heart for the rest of the day!

Had it not been quiet - almost silent - I am sure I would have missed these blessings to my ears and the joy it brought to my being.

Silence is so important, never empty - for when we stop and listen it is always full of answers and actually we should learn to listen more to the silence for it always has much to say - it is as if silence speaks when words can't!

I think this was brought home to me quite profoundly recently on Holy Saturday or Low Saturday.

On Good Friday we had very movingly placed flowers and fragrant herbs on the cross before then wrapping the cross, which was lying on the chancel steps, at the end of our Good Friday Service before leaving in silence.

On Holy Saturday I returned to the church late at night to remove the black cloths, re-dress the church for worship the next day and unwrap the cross for Easter morning.

When I went into the church it was silent, dark, and the cross stood out against the darkness lying as it was on the chancel steps wrapped in its grave clothes, to me it seemed just like Christ's body wrapped and lying there on the steps as it would have been in the tomb on Holy Saturday.

I sat for a long time in the half-light, in the silence, listening to my own heartbeat, my gaze never moving from the cross, my nostrils very aware of the scent of the flowers and fragrant herbs.

I think in that moment of silence as I gazed at that cross and smelt the herbs, and found myself becoming deeply emotional, I truly understood to the very depth of my soul the anguish of the crucifixion.

I knew I had to unwrap the cross for the next morning but it was as if my limbs would just not move forward to do so, I just couldn't bring myself to unwrap that cross.

Eventually I did rise from my seat and in silence I began to take down the black cloths my gaze ever returning to the cross. I re-dressed the church but still I could not will myself to unwrap the cross.

As I sat gazing at the cross once more the silence of the church was broken by a knock on the door of the church and thankfully Graham appeared. As if sensing that it would be emotional and difficult for me to unwrap that cross he came over and together with great emotion and in deep silence we finally unwrapped the cross and placed it in the garden for Easter morning.

The silence that night was profound, it was deeply emotional, but for me it was not empty, it was full of answers, it was full of understanding, it was soul touching, it was a meaningful silence which is always better than meaningless words.


That silence was a gift and silence always is a gift.

What we must learn to do is make time for silence - not to be afraid of silence - we must learn to value its very essence for then silence can truly touch our hearts and our minds and the very depth of our souls.

May you, in your life, find times of silence or make time for silence that you may come to learn to value it and learn from its very essence – it can be a very profound feeling.



We were told that our partners could also attend the meeting to see us getting our certificates and that the presentations would be at the beginning of the meeting and that we would all be able to leave after this item of business.

One of my friends on the course was Jim, the session clerk from Uddingston Old and his wife, Fiona, attended along with May. When we arrived, all those to receive certificates were seated at the front in alphabetical order and May and Fiona were seated right at the back of the church. 
