Dear Friends.

It seems that almost every letter, pamphlet, charity newsletter or charity appeal that has come through the door of the manse in recent weeks have highlighted the theme of Transformation.

Transformation of buildings - such as the proposed redevelopment of our local Hospice to bring it up to modern day standards and in so doing allow more people to be cared for within the St Andrew's Hospice.

Transformation of whole communities - enabled by people working for charities such as Christian Aid or Water Aid who by working in local contexts seek to transform communities in simple ways.

Transformation of lives - by those such as the Bethany Trust who enable lives to be transformed through their volunteers, their recovery programs and even through play therapy; or indeed by groups such as the Scottish Bible Society who transform lives by bringing the good news to people who desperately seek to hear it.

Realistically, all transformation requires change of some sort and so often it seems that the block to any sort of transformation can be a real reluctance to embrace even a small amount of change.

We all know change is never easy!

We may have to leave behind some of what we find comfortable - some of what we know so well - some of our own particular ways of doing things and that can make us selfishly cling on to all that is familiar to us.

Sometimes though in doing that we can be blocking the work of the Spirit and actually hindering God's work of transformation in our lives, our communities and our world and that is a great pity.

As I write this Pentecost approaches - the day we celebrate the birthday of the church - the day we remember the giving of the gift of the Holy Spirit. It certainly brought about great transformation that day! Not just an emboldening of the disciples to actually leave their hiding place and go out and spread the good news but also in the emboldening of all of us even today that we too might be transformed and get out and about doing God's work and transforming his world too!

You know we should not fear change - for the Spirit is always within us and always around us in others - swirling all through God's world and God's people and the Spirit will always be there to help us through any times of change required or times of transformation.

So when the need to embrace change arises in order to bring about transformations why not do as the chorus says and 'Be Bold, Be Strong for the Lord your God is with you' - always!

CHANGE IS ALL AROUND US

At a recent meeting of the Kirk Session, it was decided that our custom of distributing communion cards will cease. From now on, the magazine will only be produced quarterly and be delivered by elders two weeks prior to communion. In this way, the magazine would double as an invitation to communion therefore communion cards will no longer be required.

We would appeal for more folks to submit articles for our magazine or alternatively approach the minister or any of our office bearers with ideas to enhance the format or content. This same appeal has been made before with little response so it would be terrific if more would come forward with their content or ideas.

Current church membership is only 49% of what it was in 1990. Congregations are reducing at the rate of 14.5% p.a. With the reduction in church attendances, the minister agreed to arrange a joint session meeting with Wrangholm to share ideas as to how this trend may be reversed.
