From our minister, The Rev Caryl Kyle

Many years ago, when just newly married and living in Keynsham, where Graham worked for Cadbury's at their Fry's factory, I was feeling quite a bit homesick and finding it hard to settle into life way down there between Bath and Bristol.

So I decided to throw myself into creating our garden!

Cadbury's had found us, and the couple who lived below us, who had come down from Cadbury's Bourneville factory in Birmingham, our lovely two-bedroom flats which were part of a new build estate in a very quiet area of Keynsham.

Our garden was huge and of course, being a new build home, the garden was not really a garden at all at this stage but rather a dumping site for all the building rubble. However, to combat my homesickness and to help me settle in I threw myself into spending each day in my garden clearing a different area each time until it was all ready to be planned out and planted. I borrowed a garden design book from the library and set about designing our garden - choosing vegetables for here, flowers for there, shrubs for the shrub beds, and paths and patios to help make it a practical and peaceful place!

The couple who lived below us - who we called Mr. and Mrs. H. - had laid their garden to lawn because they were both nearing retirement and it was more practical for them but Mr. H., who by the way was Scottish himself, on seeing my ventures suggested to me that if I wanted

to try and attract the butterflies to my garden, and the bees to help with the pollination of all my plants, then I should make sure I planted a Buddleia somewhere in the garden. I took his advice and my Buddleia was duly planted and as it grew my 'butterfly bush' did indeed attract a few butterflies to the garden - and lots of bees making it a very fruitful garden.

I also made sure that wherever we lived after that that there was always a Buddleia planted somewhere in our garden to attract the butterflies – and indeed it was delightful when we moved into the manse to see that the manse garden had one too and when we moved to our new home in Largs that we had to pass one every time we walked into Largs!

Now many times we have walked past that Largs Buddleia bush and noticed a few butterflies on it and taken time to watch them as they fed but last week on passing it we were enveloped in butterflies as they all took to flight at once as we passed and it was wonderful to stand still among them and see all these beautiful 'Painted Lady' butterflies fluttering around us before then settling down once more to feast on the blooms of the Buddleia. They were just not interested in the other blooms around them only the Buddleia!

It was quite surprising therefore to read the very next morning that there was an all-time high of Painted Lady butterflies this year and that this was something which occurred every ten years - we were also being encouraged to count those we saw and report on them. I certainly could not have counted the ones which fluttered around us the previous night because they were so numerous - as well as being so beautiful in the evening sunlight!

As always this made me think and believe it or not it made me think on the situation we have at present with the decline of our church.

If a Buddleia is planted to attract butterflies what might we 'plant' as a church which might attract folk to us?



Of course, knowing what to 'plant' is the difficult part and the fruitfulness of what we 'plant' might take time to attract folk but like all those Buddleias I have planted over the years, the time will come I am sure, when we will be inundated but not with butterflies but with folk; for God is good and we just have to trust in him and keep 'planting' to attract all we can!

For many churches The Boy's Brigade provides a bridge into communities that they otherwise might find difficult to access. And remember through The Boy's Brigade church have opportunities to reach out to families with whom they would otherwise have no contact.

General Assembly 2019

May and I had the privilege of attending this year's General Assembly as Commissioners representing this church from the 17th - 24th May in the assembly rooms in Edinburgh. Although quite a bit of time has passed since then, the following is a relatively brief report to share some of our experiences of that week.

When you get involved in a group in a work situation or in a social situation or even in a church situation, there is always chemistry between the individuals within the group. You feel aligned with some and unaligned with others despite the group, as a whole, probably having the same objectives. I experienced similar at assembly but in this situation, the size of the group was around 700. On looking around assembly hall I could see folk around the same age as myself that I guessed I could probably get along with. There were others where I thought to myself 'I could never see me

having a cup of coffee with these folk'. Despite this natural tendency to make judgement based on absolutely nothing but appearance, everyone we sat beside while having our roll and morning coffee and everyone we had some passing chat with were absolutely lovely. We ended up spending a fair amount of time with two women we had never met before. The first was Jennifer who is an elder in Denny and the second was Katie who is an elder in the Church of Scotland in Jersey in the channel Isles.

Over the week, we spoke to Iain Goring (a previous interim minister of our Church) and he's asking after you all. We spoke to David Young who you may recall, as part of his training to become a minister, led our worship on quite a few Sundays before Caryl came along and he was also asking after you all. I saw Colin Sutherland who was our Interim Moderator for a wee while but didn't get close enough to chat to him because of the crowds of tourists at the top of the Royal Mile.

Our week began at 7pm on Friday, the 17th of May. This session was predominantly for first-time commissioners. We had already received I.D. badges through the post but on arrival at the assembly rooms we were given a little keypad that clipped on to the I.D. badge. The main function of this was to register our attendance at each session but it was also used on a couple of occasions for voting. The business procedures were explained to us all and also how to get

to the various locations we may wish/need to attend in and around the building. All in all, it was very useful and took around 90mins to complete.

Assembly was formally constituted for the first time on Saturday 18th May. On that day and on each business day thereafter the day commenced with a service of worship. The new moderator, Colin Sinclair took up office with outgoing moderator Susan Brown giving a report on her year in office reflecting on her chosen theme which was 'walking with...'. The chosen theme of the new moderator was 'follow me.' A lot of business was covered during the rest of Saturday and after that all finished. I had to attend a rehearsal for the serving of communion due to take place on Monday morning which lasted about 90 minutes during which May and Katie (new friend from Jersey) adjourned to the Radisson for some 'soft drinks'

On Sunday 19th May we attended morning worship at St Giles Cathedral. The service was due to start at 10 a.m. but Caryl had told us to get there early. We arrived at 9.30 a.m. and were fortunate to get a seat. Many that arrived after this had no option but to stand for the full duration. If you ever find yourself moved by the words and music used in worship, you should make it a point to attend this service on the Sunday that lands in assembly week, you will not be disappointed. The organist was incredible but when the St Giles choir started up,

the shivers ran up and down my spine - in a good way. When the huge congregation joined in with the singing combined with the historic setting, it made for a very special experience indeed. The moderator delivered the sermon and before we knew it the service was over. Although it lasted for an hour, it honestly did not feel as if an hour had passed. After that, there was time to grab a coffee and a sandwich before heading down to Princes Street Gardens for the 'Heart and Soul' event. The weather could have been kinder but despite this it was well attended, all the usual stalls were there and the main stage had live performers Our favourite was the Inbetweeners choir from St Marys in Motherwell who were great and performed for about 30 minutes. Monday began with the celebration of Holy Communion. The communion hymn was Ye Gates. I had seen at presbytery meetings that there is no musical accompaniment while singing a hymn, only voices but here with 800 voices singing such a rousing hymn with no organ playing along, what a wonderful sound was produced. It was incredibly moving. There was about 50 of us involved in the serving but after having rehearsed it, it all went reasonably smoothly.

It can be easy for us to be totally wrapped up in the business within our own parish. We often hear the church is not about the buildings and that it is about the people all over the world, our brothers and sisters in Christ, with a shared belief in this faith

that we all claim to follow. I would love to see the work of our church being more widely publicised and I would like to see more opportunities for mixing and meeting with our fellow Christians and forming Christian links at home and abroad. Maybe this is something we could all include in our prayers. If you have any ideas of how the church (locally or generally) could be doing better, please pass on your ideas to the minister or the session clerk and they will take your ideas to the appropriate committee at Presbytery where they will be seriously considered.


I thought it would be worthwhile sharing with you some of the Christian activity that is going on here and in other parts of the world to remind us what we are a part of.

Your opportunity to help shape the Church's plan for land and buildings

Over the next few months, the Church of Scotland General Trustees will be inviting your views on one of the most crucial issues for the future of our Church: how best to manage our church land and buildings. Every congregation and presbytery is encouraged to contribute through an online survey and a series of workshops across Scotland. Come along to a local workshop or watch the live webinar, and then take some time to fill in our land and buildings survey

The online survey will run until Saturday 12 October, giving you the chance to express your views on the best ways to manage, use and maintain our buildings for the future. It (and accompanying papers) can be accessed via the Church of Scotland Website.

Rt Rev Colin Sinclair, the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, encouraged everyone to get involved with the process, saying:

"At the General Assembly this year there was an overwhelming endorsement of the need to change. The work of the Special Commission and the Radical Action Plan were adopted and work to implement them has already begun. However, it was stressed at the Assembly that there was a third aspect to this work which affects the land and buildings we use and the need for 'well equipped spaces in the right places' as a resource for worship, mission and outreach.

"Buildings are hugely important to everyone in the Church and we all have strong feelings about the buildings we know best. We need to get this right. So, I very much welcome the General Trustees consultation which asks all of us to complete the online survey on how best to manage our land and

buildings. This can be completed by individuals, kirk sessions and presbyteries and input at all these levels will be immensely helpful."

"This consultation is important, so I encourage everyone who cares about the Church to take time to work through the survey and make their views known. This will ensure that the plan that will go to the 2020 General Assembly will be the very best plan we can make for the future of our congregations as well as for the mission of the Church."

Have your voice heard

Read through the land and buildings plan proposals paper to get acquainted with the ideas being considered. The proposals put forward have been prepared in consultation with fabric conveners, presbyteries and other church representatives, and many of them were also considered at seminars throughout 2017-2018 where over 1,000 congregational representatives were present.

Next, book yourself a place at one of your local workshops through Eventbrite. During the events, you will learn about the proposals welcomed by the 2019 General Assembly and how to help shape the plan that will go to the 2020 General Assembly. Can't make a local event? We'll be holding a live webinar on Monday 7 October where one of our General Trustees and a representative from BEFS will be answering questions. More details will follow on this nearer the time.

Once you've had time to reflect on everything you've heard, it's time to fill in the survey. It takes 25-30 minutes to complete. All responses recorded will be anonymous and will contribute to the final consultation report, which will be publicly available. The General Trustees and the buildings consultancy team will use the report to help shape proposals which will be presented and voted upon at next year's General Assembly.


"I am the way, the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father except by me. John 14:6

Story behind the hymn "Amazing Grace"

Amazing grace! (how sweet the sound)
That sav'd a wretch like me!
I once was lost, but now am found,
Was blind, but now I see.

'Twas grace that taught my heart to fear,
And grace my fears reliev'd;
How precious did that grace appear
The hour I first believ'd!

Thro' many dangers, toils, and snares,

I have already come;
'Tis grace hath brought me safe thus far,

And grace will lead me home.

The Lord has promis'd good to me, His word my hope secures; He will my shield and portion be As long as life endures.

Yes, when this flesh and heart shall fail,
And mortal life shall cease;
I shall possess, within the veil,
A life of joy and peace.

The earth shall soon dissolve like snow,
The sun forbear to shine;
But God, who call'd me here below,
Will be forever mine.

It was written by a most remarkable man, John Newton. In his young days he was very wild and wicked; a sinner of the blackest dye, but by the grace of God, he was converted and became one of the holiest of saints, and the writer of this and many other beautiful hymns. The secret of his salvation lay in the happy fact that he had had one of God's greatest and best gifts; a godly, praying mother. She died when he was only seven, but she has so stored his mind with texts and Bible teaching, she had so prayed for him and dedicated him to God that her influence never left him



John Newton was born in London, July 24th, 1725. He was an only child. His father was a sea captain and, at the age of ten, went to sea with his father. The young boy was thrown amongst a lot of loose and abandoned companions and quickly learnt their evil ways so much so that even among them he became notorious for wickedness. He would curse and blaspheme so terribly that even the men were surprised at his depravity.

He was subsequently forced by the press- gang into the Navy. He was soon promoted to the rank of midshipman but was soon disgraced and later dismissed for insubordination. He took service under a West African slave dealer and was at one time captain of a slave ship and engaged in the capture and traffic of slaves.

At the age of 23 a ship in which he was sailing encountered a violent storm, sprang a leak and was in danger of sinking. In his agony and alarm Newton cried aloud, "May the Lord have mercy upon us." This was the first prayer he had uttered for years. The ship was saved and he began to think and reflect on his life. He took his Bible, read and prayed, and slowly the light of Christ shone in upon his soul. He also came under the influence of a godly captain who greatly helped him.

In 1779 John Newton became the Rector of St Mary's Woolnoth, Lombard Street, in London, where for twenty-seven years more he lived and loved and laboured. The Church is close to the Royal Exchange and the Bank of England. His preaching attracted large crowds. No London clergyman of that day exercised a greater influence than did John Newton. His one desire was to show what Christ had done for him and could do for others. Two years before his death, when, on account of his age and infirmities, he was pressed to discontinue preaching, his reply was, "What, shall the old African blasphemer stop while he can speak?"




