From our minister, The Rev Caryl Kyle

Well, by the time you read this Advent will be on the way for it begins on 1st December this year and that will be the day when our Advent wreath comes into church and we begin to banish the darkness. It is also the day when we share a time of remembrance with those who have lost loved ones throughout the year at our Blue Christmas Service.

Advent is a season of preparation — but each year we need to ask ourselves — what exactly are we preparing ourselves for over those four weeks of hope, peace, joy and love.

When I was reflecting on this notion of Advent being a season of preparation it seemed to me that personally I actually spend a lot of my time preparing already!

As I write, I have just finished packing for my holiday having firstly prepared a list of what I wanted to take!

On a weekly basis in my ministerial life each day I would be preparing for my personal devotions, for school assemblies, for the Sunday Services, for the Bible Study Group, preparing my visiting lists and prayerfully preparing for those visits and for those I would be visiting.

As each season of the church year approaches it sees me preparing for that season but also beyond it so I get the overarching flow of the church year — so at the moment while I am preparing for Advent I am also preparing ahead to Christmas and Epiphany and Lent and Holy Week and Easter and Pentecost.

Preparing is just something I am very used to as a person — even as a teacher I had to produce not just daily plans, but weekly plans and monthly plans and yearly plans too — lots of preparation!

Even as a mum and wife I had to be prepared for all the different family activities and, of course, prepare the menus for the week and then prepare the meals too!



So loads and loads of preparation going on in and throughout my life and I am sure going on in your life too!

But - is this the preparation we are talking about in Advent?

I think much of the preparation of which I have spoken is more about getting ourselves organised rather than anything else and I actually think Advent is much more than that — more than just practical preparing and getting ourselves organised for Christmas time!

So how do we prepare for the coming of Emmanuel - God with us?

I think we have to take time to reflect deeply on our spiritual lives throughout this season and ask ourselves if deep down in our souls we are really ready to meet Emmanuel.

For me, this is an inner, spiritual preparation time — a time where we prepare our hearts and minds and souls for this wonderful mystery to come of God with us.

One of my fellow writers on the Spill the Beans Team – the Rev Roddy Hamilton – speaks of Advent like this:

The mystery begins

Where the winter finds its feet

the rush of frost and chill

competes with the old hope of incarnation

Darker nights unfold

and with the fading of the light

the sun weakens

held by this frozen earth

wrapped in winters frost

the mystery of the ancient hope is alight once more


for from the stump of Jesse





The Legend of Robin Redbreast

A few months ago we were in the process of locking up the Church after morning worship when we discovered two Robin Redbreasts flying around the entrance vestibule. It is probably the closest that we have been to these two very small but wonderful little birds. A week without food,



fresh-air, water, nourishment was unthinkable, so the only alternative was to try and persuade them to leave the warmth and shelter of the Church and fly away. It took 3 of us adults a good 20 mins, a lot of flapping, tweeting, whistling and encouragement but eventually our mission was successful as one of the little birds flew outside. All 3 of us were out of puff, chasing them up and down the staircase and waving our arms frantically to encourage their exit. Finally....... success.......the second Robin Redbreast flew away up into the sunlit sky and 3 very tired parishioners could get down the road for some well-earned lunch!

This true story reminded me of the Legend of Robin Redbreast which is from a 'Christmas Stocking' by Louise Betts Egan. It tells the story of how the robin got his red breast after burning himself on a fire he fanned to keep the baby Jesus warm. Another legend says that the robin's breast is red because of his association with Christ's death and crucifixion. When Jesus was on the road to Calvary it is said that a robin plucked a thorn from Christ's temple and a drop of Jesus' blood fell on the robin's chest, turning it red.

On that first Christmas, it is said, the night was wrapped in a bitter chill. The small fire in the stable was nearly out, and the Mother Mary worried that her baby would be cold. She turned to the animals about her and asked them for help.

"Could you blow on the embers," she asked the ox, "so the fire might continue to keep my son warm?"

But the ox lay sound asleep on the stable floor and did not hear her. Next, Mary asked the donkey to breathe life back into the fire, but the sleeping donkey did not



hear Mary either. Nor did the horse or sheep. She wondered what to do.

Suddenly, Mary heard a fluttering of little wings. Looking up, she saw a plain, brown-coloured little robin fly into the stall. This robin had heard Mary calling to the animals and had come to help her himself. He went over to the dying fire and flapped his wings hard.

His wings were like little bellows, huffing and puffing air onto the embers, until they glowed bright red again. He continued to fan the fire, singing all the while, until the ashes began to kindle.

With his beak, the robin picked up some fresh, dry sticks and tossed them into the fire. As he did, a flame suddenly burst forth and burned the little bird's breast a bright red. But the robin simply continued to fan the fire until it crackled brightly and warmed the entire stable. The Baby Jesus slept happily.

Mary thanked and praised the robin for all he had done. She looked tenderly at his red breast, burned by the flame, and said "From now on, let your red breast be a blessed reminder of your noble deed."

And to this day, the robin's red breast covers his humble heart.

Redundancy

When someone is made redundant, it is not only their job that they lose. Not everyone is lucky enough to have a redundancy package and for most people they are suddenly presented with a big financial problem, but they also lose the structure, the relationships



and the purpose that shaped most of their days. People's sense of their own worth can be terribly damaged. Often that has an impact on all their friends and family, because the anxiety and hurt of the trauma cause relationships to become strained. Children and partners can find the new circumstances just as difficult because of the change of atmosphere at home.

If this is describing you, these words are written with sympathy and in the hope that that you will find them sensitive. If you have been made redundant, there are several things that you need to address:

You need someone to listen to you who will not attempt to change the subject because they are embarrassed by the fact that you are not your usual self. Christians believe that God has put them together in communities (churches) in order for them to find support. Do not attempt to keep your feelings to yourself, but seek friends.

You need to address the new financial circumstances you are in. If you live in the UK, advice about what your entitlements are is available from the Citizens' Advice Bureau https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk/scotland/ However, you also need to adjust your spending to fit the new situation, and a first step is to work out without panicking what monthly expenses are necessities and which are luxuries that can be cut.

You need to think about how you are going to get your next job. So ensure your CV is up to date, and that the applications you make for jobs read well and do not have spelling mistakes. Most churches have people in them who have experience of this kind, and it is hoped that asking for help would receive a positive response. Be prepared to apply many times and do not give up hope.



And also, you need to think who you are. The true you is not simply an employee. Your job was only a small part of you. Christians believe that the way God sees you is not as a worker, but as a person with skills, a person with love to share, a person able to do good in the neighbourhood, a person who creates things that add to the beauty in the world. At this point in your life, all those things can take on their full significance. You may find this to be the occasion when you think about the way you relate to God, because he is absolutely unable to reject you no matter how you feel you have been rejected by others.

The Christian faith is based on death and resurrection. Jesus Christ, whom Christians follow, took that journey. His followers invariably at points in their lives experience the same. Redundancy is the end of a job, but it is only one chapter in the ongoing life which God has given you.

But over and over it clearly says,

"TRUST IN GOD."

Karaoke – a nothing to do with Christmas story

This is not a particularly Christmas story but I thought I would share it with you and, it is all true. I had been spending a Saturday in darkest Glasgow recently and at long last after spending



what felt like days (as opposed to hours) in Debenhams with my better half, we were heading to Central Station for a train home. Our route took us past the Horseshoe Bar so we decided to nip in for a wee 'coffee'! It was about 'four deep' at the downstairs bar but the bouncer (it was only about 4.30pm and they had a bouncer on the door!!!) told us we could go upstairs and that there would be more room up there. We took the bouncer's advice and proceeded up a whole lot of stairs until we reached the upstairs lounge. Now it was only about one quarter full but there were reserved signs on all the available tables for a private party that was due in. We explained we were only intending being in for about half an hour so we got sitting down at one of the reserved tables. After we ordered our 'coffees' and began to enjoy them it was noticeable that the place was filling up and after about ten minutes, a DJ appeared and announced karaoke was about to begin and someone came round all the tables with a wee bit of paper you could write the name of the song you would like to sing. I may add that ours remained blank. The DJ started the singing and he was pretty good and a couple of singers that followed after him were also good, they could hold a tune and earned some polite

applause when they finished. We were just about to head off when a young lady in her early twenties took the mic. And you could see from the tv screen that she was going to sing 'I say a little prayer' by Aretha Franklin. Now I love music and in terms of female vocalists, I like Eva Cassidy, Dusty Springfield, Whitney Houston and quite a few others but my overall favourite is Aretha Franklin so I looked towards the stage with great expectation and thought....'this could go two ways!'. The intro had begun and the young lady at the mic was already getting some body movement started and looked confident and then, the first line was delivered — 'the moment I wake up, when I put on my make up...I say a little prayer for you!' It became immediately apparent that this wasn't an Aretha 'sound alike', no and far from it,..... a million light years far from it! Different thoughts came to me along the lines of:

- How many verses are in this song?
- Would it be rude to gulp what was left of my 'coffee' and leave quickly?
- What was everybody else thinking?
- What would this lassie's parents think if they could hear this performance?
- In the next life, would the deceased Aretha now be labelled as 'birling Aretha'?
- If anyone hadn't heard the real Aretha, this could not be considered to be a good advert for her work.
- I even thought that the sound of fingernails getting scraped down an old blackboard would be preferable

The reaction in the lounge surprised me pleasantly because everybody was joining in enthusiastically with the lines that are repeated and there wasn't a disapproving face in the house. I thought this said more about Glasgow folk than anything else so we joined in as well and by the end of the song, this young lady received a bigger round of applause than anyone that had gone before her and everyone in the room, ourselves included were wearing broad smiles.

I was trying to think if there was any message or morals to be gleaned from this experience and the best I could come up with is as follows: If for any reason the



minister can't be there on a Sunday morning, please treat whoever is standing in with the same good grace that the folks of Glasgow showed on that rainy Saturday afternoon to that wee lassie that sang the song made famous by the legend that was Aretha Franklin.

- Could you please help me remember to phone or visit friends I haven't seen for a while.

- Could you please make more people say please, thank you and good morning.

Jottings from the late 1950s and 1960s

Articles 1-3 (Margaret Milne)

When the Rev James McLeman was the minister, he had a Bible class which met at 5.30 pm. Initially the number of young folk attending was under ten — it was said that only four attended the first meeting. Undaunted, the Bible Class continued to meet in the vestry, but, before long it moved into the Church. At first the first two or three pews were occupied. News of how interesting the Bible Class was spread. More and more seats were needed. It would be no exaggeration to say that the numbers were up to between sixty and seventy.

Why was this happening? Mr McLeman was going through a three-year course. Incidentally, the age of those attending crept up and up as everyone wanted to complete the course.

From time to time we had a social evening in the Hall. A two-=piece band played. During the evening Mr & Mrs McLeman came over from the Manse and joined in.

Naturally, we raised cash and were able not only to give a donation to the Church but also to pay for the young worshippers' league prizes but also to give to the Church's Foreign Mission and Church Extension Funds in Edinburgh.

The story of the Bible Class in the 1950's and 1960's would not be complete if one very special evening is omitted. To the best of my knowledge such an event had never taken place. It has certainly never been repeated.

A cat had bee roaming about outside the Church, with a little encouragement from a few Bible Class members it was wheedled into the pulpit and was lying on the pulpit cushion. Those of us at Evening Worship knew all about the cat but the congregation did not. Mr McLeman went into the pulpit and sat down extremely carefully. He said absolutely nothing. What those who didn't know about the cat must have wondered at the minister's actions but still nothing was said. Puss must have been quite comfortable because it was absolutely quiet. The crunch came at



the end of the service when the minister turned around and picked the cat up and carried it down the pulpit steps. He later took it over to the manse and fed it.

Even at Bible Class the next Sunday he said nothing.

I do believe he realised just how good a rapport he had with the Bible Class as otherwise no one would have dared to get Puss into the pulpit. The story has no doubt been told on a number of occasions. The McLemans left Holytown in 1956. Initially Mr McLeman was in Burghead but later Alves was linked to create a ministry in a fishing community and one in a farming community.

The Union Representative

When visiting Rec J McLeman in Elgin he told me he had become the Union Rep. How did this happen? The group of houses in which he lived were supposed to have their gardens looked after by Moray Council. For some time, no one from the Council had done anything to the gardens. The neighbours persuaded Mr MLeman to go to the Council Offices to find out what was going on. He did as requested and was successful. This, he said, made him the Union Representative for his area.

From the way in which he told the story it was clear that he had thoroughly enjoyed the experience.

In Years gone by

If it were possible to turn the clock back eighty years, what would we find?

One notable change is the time of the Morning Service. It did not begin until 12 noon — quite a change from today's time. The Sunday School met from 1.30 pm to 2.30 pm. The Primary Sunday School met at the same time as the Seniors. The Primary Sunday School did not meet during the Morning Service until January 1949.

The Church Hall was very different. In the main hall there was a small stage with two steps up on to it. At each side of the stage the senior boys and the senior girls met. We had forms in those days. A few individual chairs were used by the Sunday School teachers. In the remainder of the hall the other classes were arranged.

The numbers were much higher than today – approximately 100 in the Senior

In those days everyone had to memorise a text which was later recited during thee lesson. Marks were awarded according to how well you had learned the text.

These marks were used when awarding prizes. Quite a few did not receive a prize.

We did not go back to learning the shorter catechism although a question was specified in the little booklet, we all had to guide us. We did, however, learn the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20) and the Beatitudes (St Matthew 5).

The Senior boys were taught by Mr David I Paterson, grandfather of our Elder and the Senior girls by Miss Margaret Young (better known as Maggie Young).

Mr Paterson was the Superintendent and conducted opening and closing devotions. Miss Young played the piano. Mr Douglas was an army chaplain for several years). When the minister, Rev Robert Douglas was on leave he came to the Sunday School and went around to speak to the boys and girls. After his return he said that he had missed seeing the children growing up — something about which he could do nothing.

Well do I remember that the only Christmas carol we sang was "Who is He in Yonder Stall?" Other hymns which appeared very regularly included:

• Holy Spirit, hear us

Sunday School.

- Great God, and will thou condescend
- Let us with a gladsome mind
- Stand up! Stand up for Jesus
- Jesus, holy undefiled
- God who made the earth
- God is always near me
- Loving Shepherd of the sheep
- Gentle Jesus, meek and mild



During the 1940s the Sunday School trip went to South Howden Farm where George Warnock, a good friend of Mr Paterson, was the farmer. We all walked there as a group, complete with mugs for tea. Races were held. Miss Young had a black cloth bag with a drawstring. She put the bag on her wrist. From the bag she careful took out 3d (3 pennies) to give to whoever was first, 2d for the second and 1d for the third. The rest received nothing.

The picnic in the field was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone. The milk for the tea came from the farm.

Mr Paterson kept a register of Church attendance. At the end of the year, the calendar year at that time a number of prizes were given. This preceded the Young Worshippers League.

Let me add a little about Mr Paterson and Miss Young. When the Church gave its approval to having women on the Congregational Board, Miss young was among the first to be appointed.

As well as being in the Sunday School Mr Paterson was the Church Treasurer, Session Clerk, and, for many years the Presbytery elder. He was also the founder Captain of the Boys' Brigade Company.

Just how many young lives were influenced by Mr Paterson and Miss Young is impossible to assess. There is no doubt they both had a wonderful influence for good at all times.


